Introduction

Title I Narrative

 - Stakeholder Engagement in Data Analysis
 - 1. Data Sources: iReady, MCAP, ACCESS for ELLs, and Benchmarks.
 - 2. We will meet quarterly with parents to discuss current data and how we will address student growth. Coffee with the Principal (virtual and in-person).
 - 3. During quarterly meetings we provided information about our programs, comprehensive, Autism, and Title I. In the discussion, we may include MSDE star ratings in detail; conduct MCAP preparation nights to promote parent assessment literacy about the assessment, and give stakeholders an opportunity to learn about our data and root causes. We also discuss in detail our Title I budget and how the funds are used to support student achievement. During our annual Autism Conference, community members, to include the local police and fire departments, community store owners, and residents in the neighborhood, are provided an opportunity to gain a better understanding about Autism and its prevalence; specifically how Autism impacts our school community directly and its overall academic impact. Our process to include all stakeholders in our data analysis is to provide the opportunity for parents via quarterly parent meetings, Spring semester academic parent night, and semester parent teacher conferences to review the data and to provide their input on PD for parents and teachers to gain a better understanding of the data.
 - 4. We will use Class Dojo, the school website, school messenger, and our home/school folders to disseminate flyers, share the powerpoint presentations (including the agendas), our SANE documents will be electronic.

 - Stakeholder Engagement on SPP Team
 - 1. Members of our parent community are invited sit on our School Planning and Management Team (SPMT) meetings, which also includes our Leadership Team and grade level team leaders. We meet monthly, every first Tuesday from 1:30 2:30 pm, to collaboratively make school-wide decisions. During these meetings stakeholders are given the opportunity to give input on the school's SPP/ Title I Plan.
 - 2. and 3. We will be inviting parents and our community partners to monthly SPMT meetings to review the SPP. Stakeholders will be notified via Class DoJo, emailed Google invites, school website, School Messenger,

with the Zoom links and agendas. All revisions will be added to our next steps section of the meeting agenda with the assigned person to complete the action item.

 - Stakeholder Input on PFE Plan & Compact
 - 1. Each quarter, our parent community, alongside the school administrative team, will continue to hold Parent meetings to afford parents an opportunity to provide feedback, input, suggestions and observations to plan for instructional programs, allocate resources, and plan parent training using the identified parent and families' needs. During these meetings parents are engaged in a discussion about the school's parent and family engagement plan and the school-parent compact. Additionally, during parent meetings with administrators, parents are asked to discuss ways they can best help to support initiatives including a Parent Data Night and Literacy Night that will be offered to parents throughout the year as written in our Title I Plan and Home School Compacts.
 - 2. Our School-Parent Compact and Parent-Family Engagement plan was shared via a Google form on Class Dojo.

 - Stakeholder Input on PFE Allocation
 - 1. Our Title I Orientation was presented during Back to School night and was also shared in our October Parent Newsletter. During the meeting parents received an overview of the Title I program, program eligibility and ways to be engaged in their children's education. We will continue to solicit support from the Title I office for the purpose of planning to reach out to parents and families. During such presentations, parents and families are provided a detailed definition of Title I, a description of Programs and Initiatives, our school's Parent and Family Engagement allocation and goals, and various ways to get engaged.
 - 2. Surveys are used to gather input from parents and receive their feedback. Feedback is typically gathered through google forms and electronic evaluation forms. Input and suggestions gathered from parents are used

to allocate resources to address academic support and academic achievement. This year, we will incorporate the use of Google Forms for survey and evaluation for the purpose of gathering data. Our specific school budget information will be shared during the November parent meeting.

 - 1. Our funding sources include SBB and Title I. Several of our local community partners support our school with donations; some are one-time donations and some are ongoing. Some of the local donations include, school supplies, Brighter Bites, loaves of bread, school uniforms including shoes, and holiday gift and grocery baskets. Our local police department facilitates a Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program for grades 5-6. They also routinely read to a class daily during the last 15 minutes of the day, as a part of our "Drop Everything and Read" COPS (DEAR COPS) initiative.
