 In preparation for School Year 2022-2023, school teams composed of educators, parents and community partners convened in May 2022 to analyze summative instructional data and parent input survey results to

As a part of this process, a comprehensive needs assessment was conducted with state assessment data from Winter and Spring 2021/2022. The school gathered data to update our instructional goals, as a part of the district-wide school improvement process. Multiple sources of qualitative and quantitative data were gathered: the Maryland Comprehensive Assessment Program (MCAP), Maryland Integrated Science Assessment, the Diagnostic Reading Assessment (DRA) and, Measures Assessment Progress. Additionally, the KRA data is used and analyzed to determine kindergarten readiness that allows teachers to measure each child's school readiness across multiple domains in both reading and math.

These sources of data were analyzed for the purpose of identifying instructional needs, determining strengths, weaknesses, and contributing factors to the performance of students in three academic core areas: reading, math and science and to allocate funds to supplement the teaching of reading and math. In addition, information from learning walks, formal and informal observations, and data from parent surveys and school climate were included to inform this needs assessment.

At the Start of SY 22-23, students in grades K-5 will be administered diagnostic assessments in Reading and Math(K-5). All results of Diagnostic Assessments (Reading, Math) and Quarterly Benchmarks will be shared with stakeholders via email. Parents will receive individual student reports by US mail or student backpacks where online access is not available. Individual student data will be discussed during Parent Teacher Nights and Conferences.

At Back To School Night in September 2022, SPP SMART goals will be shared with families in order to provide the school's direction toward academic improvement. Regularly, surveys will be administered to all stakeholders in order to obtain current input.
