

An Artist's Statement: Robert Wesley

"I have always been captivated by the art of storytelling; whether that be through a good book, TV series, movie, music, etc. All art is about telling a story and I love a good story! I tend to be a shy, quiet, and reserved person, but I'm free to be whoever I want to be when I am creating my art. Picasso said something that rings so true for me: 'Art washes away from the soul the dust of everyday life.' Art is an escape for me. I'm not one of the 'cool kids,' but when I'm drawing I feel like I am ten feet tall—nothing can touch me! In the book, No Man is an Island, Thomas Merton spoke my very personal feelings when he said, 'Art enables us to find ourselves and lose ourselves at the same time.' When I create my art, I am telling my story. But what I create is such that, when viewed, it is interpreted and internalized as the viewers' story; to me that is what good art should be/do. Art is my therapy."





### Arts Integration in Action Elizabeth Stuart Whitehead

The energizing sounds of jazz coming from a fifth-grade English Language Arts classroom pulls you in. Opening the door, you see that same energy buzzing as small groups of students engage in collaborative conversation, focusing on the task at hand. Suddenly, everyone falls silent as one student picks up a cardboard microphone to introduce the *Maniac Magee Poetry Radio Show Broadcast*.

A live "radio show" ensues, featuring theme songs curated by students, poetry and scripts written by students, and original songs composed and performed by students. The room breaks into applause as one young radio host raps about the theme of friendship in the assigned novel that is the focal point of all this creativity.

#### The Arts Integrated Classroom

The high level of engagement and enthusiastic sense of accomplishment these fifth-graders display is an everyday occurrence in an Arts Integrated (AI) classroom. Imagine if every student in every school had access to this inspirational approach to learning. Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) in Maryland believes this is possible and is well on our way to making it a reality.

In PGCPS, arts integration does not replace the arts instructors. Arts skills and content are organically incorporated in other curriculum areas, including science, French and Spanish immersion, social studies, reading/English Language Arts, and math. Instruction is taught in and through the arts, based on clear instructional standards in both content areas. Assessments should demonstrate learning in both art and nonart concepts. Through professional development and support from arts supervisors and other artists, our schools are using AI in different ways: whole school, grade level, content level, and interdisciplinary.

### **Prince George's County**

Located in Maryland, Prince George's County is adjacent to Washington, DC. PGCPS is one of the nation's 25 largest school districts and the second largest school system in Maryland. Currently, there are 132,000 students, 209 schools, and our demographics are

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58 percent Black or African American, 33 percent Hispanic/Latino, 4 percent White, 3 percent Asian, 0.4 percent American Indian/Alaska Native, 0.2 percent Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 16 percent ESOL, and 64 percent Free and Reduced Meal Students (FARMS).

In 2013, when Dr. Kevin Maxwell became CEO of PGC, he created a goal and vision to bring AI to the school system. The desire was for AI strategies to be used as an approach to teaching in all 209 schools. He appointed the nation's first-ever AI officer, John Ceschini. Supervisors from all five arts disciplines, instructional specialists, resource teachers, and teaching artists support the county's growing AI program.

Ceschini and his staff designed a systemic rollout plan, piloting fifteen schools in year one and increasing to eighty schools in year five. Not only is AI being used in these schools, but the number of arts teachers and various arts disciplines in the school system are increasing as well.

### **Implementation**

How was AI implemented on such a large scale? It was important to create a system of support with specific measurable steps for potential AI schools. The principals of these schools signed a letter of intent detailing the responsibilities of the AI office and the school's commitment to additional responsibilities.

In PGC, educators and students in the individual schools are using AI strategies. They share the belief that AI is an approach to teaching and learning that strengthens student achievement and motivation by encouraging teachers to explore new ideas, take risks, promote opportunity for student choice, and differentiate based on student needs.

AI training opportunities include extensive professional development sessions and lesson or unit planning support. Every school participating in the initiative designates an AI lead teacher who serves as the liaison between the school and central office, as well as heads the school's professional learning community and organizes school-wide events.

#### A Model Program

PGCPS recognizes that, for arts integration to succeed, arts experts in each school building are essential. We believe that this is the largest arts integration effort made nationwide. The PGCPS AI initiative serves as a showcase and roadmap for the large-scale systemic implementation of AI. Passion for the use of AI strategies systemically arose from the vision of creative, collaborative spaces where all children have access to teaching and learning in and through the arts, and all students have multiple pathways for success.


### Maryland's Rethink Recycling Contest 2019
